Judging will be based on the following criteria:

- Quality of crops 25 points
- Variety of crops 25 points
- Cleanliness 20 points
- Pest and disease control 10 points
- Companion planting/originality 10 points
- Compost 10 points

HOUSEKEEPING

STABLE COMPOST BINS

PLEASE KEEP THE COMPOST BINS TIDY BY MOVING ANY NEW MATERIAL TO THE BACK OF THE BIN. IF EVERYONE WHO USES COMPOST PUTS A SMALL AMOUNT OF TIME AND EFFORT INTO THIS IT CAN SUCCEED IN KEEPING THE CAR PARKS TIDY AND THE COMPOST WELL MANAGED.

KEYS & LOCKS

A new lock has been fixed to the vehicle gate in response to your complaints to the Council. These locks have to be used with some care. ALWAYS MAKE SURE THAT YOUR KEY IS FULLY INSERTED IN THE LOCK, UP TO THE BASE OF THE TRIANGULAR TOP SECTION. REMOVE THE KEY SLOWLY SO THE TUMBLERS REALIGN THEMSELVES. IF YOU CANNOT INSERT THE KEY FULLY, 'JIGGLEI IT IN THE LOCK AND TRY AGAIN.

THEFTS

There have been a number of thefts of produce such as garlic and fruit. This is very distressing for those tenants who have been tending their crops all year to enjoy their harvest.

Please report any thefts to the Council Allotments Officer using the CONTACT THE ALLOTMENT OFFICER on the website and give Pete Lewis the details of the theft, produce stolen, plot number and date/time as closely as possible. Please also let a Committee member know what has happened. The Park Police have made some patrols but they are not frequent.

If you witness a theft, please report it to the Council or a Committee member, with as much detail as possible. If a tenant or a tenant's guest is found stealing, the Council will take action.

PATHS

All tenants are responsible for the maintenance of the paths alongside their **plots jointly with their neighbours**. Please help your neighbour the keep the grass cut and access safe.

COUNCIL LIAISON

The Council plot inspections took place on 12th June and Pete Lewis issued 22 letters to tenants inviting them to give up their plot or cultivate it to the Council T&C requirements. Seven plots have been relinquished to date.

The follow-up Plot Inspections take place on 15th July and follow-up action will be taken by Pete Lewis.

We are now keeping a photograph record of the plots that do not get the regular work that the Council requires and that a plot deserves. This is something that other allotment sites in the Borough do as a matter of course and will demonstrate to the Allotment Officer that there has been little or no activity on a plot over the year.

PESTS


ASPARAGUS BEETLE

Asparagus beetle is very active on the site. These small red, white and black beetles and their dark green grubs will destroy the young shoots of asparagus. The beetles are quite active and try and evade capture but for the health of you plants they have to be eradicated. Please check if you have asparagus and help everyone by aiming to eliminate this pest. 'Provado Ultimate Bug Killer does the job. I just destroy the beetles and larvae by hand. Photo below of the beetle.

ALLIUM LEAF MINER

My garlic crop was badly infested with allium leaf miner. I managed to save the crop by pealing back the layers of leaf covering to expose the pupae and destroy them. Hopefully the drying process at home will destroy any that I missed. Next year I will have to grow them under environment to protect them. We normally harvest enough garlic to last the whole year. This year may be the exception. A photo below shows the pupae embedded in my garlic.

This pest seems to be very variable in the localities around the site where it infests crops. People report no problems one year ant then an infestation the next. It will attack all the alliums.

SOME MORE TECHNICAL STUFF

WEEDS

We all struggle with weeds, whether you are a new plot holder tackling a neglected plot or a seasoned veteran who is under the impression that you have the weeds under control.

One bit of folk lore states that *one year's weed seed is seven years of weed growth*. Joy Larkcom's book, Just Vegetating, confirms that research supports this. Half the weed seed on or near the soil surface germinates each year. A bit of simple maths demonstrates that after seven years less than one percent of the seed will be left. However this is only if you have prevented the seed supply being augmented. Turning the soil over whilst digging may also bring more weed seed to the surface but will also bury the surface weed seed so could be a net balance.

So help yourself and other plot holders by removing weeds before they flower and produce seed. At this stage they can be added to your compost heap.

BEES

The site bee keepers have had an active summer so far with 3 or 4 swarms being reported. The bees have relished the good weather and also the supply of nectar and pollen. It is good policy to have some flowers on your plot to attract and nurture the bees and other pollinators. These can be: -

- the flowers that are producing fruit and vegetables, eg blackberry and beans that you need to be pollinated
- decorative flowers such as lavender, or
- plants selected to set seed for collection, I leave a few parsnip roots each year to flower and provide me with free seed the next year, the insects love them..
